REFLECTION

THEME: Don't Give Up Hope

At one point or another most of us have experienced unprecedented challenges. Some of those challenges threatened even to break the best of relationships and friendships. The most likely attitude we assume when we feel let down, is to cut-off that relationship or friendship – at times we become very rude and blunt; if that person try to reach-out. We ignore their calls, stop responding to their emails, if you notice them coming your direction, you make a quick change of direction – all because you feel let down by them!

Jesus had three great friends who were members of the same family – a brother and two sisters who lived in a suburb called Bethany. In our Bible reading, John tells us that, Jesus loved these siblings. And based on their friendship, when Lazarus their brother became ill, they send a message to inform Jesus about it. Probably hoping that would drop what he was doing and rush to be with them in their hour of need. But as we know, Jesus did not go right away. The Bible says, he remained where he was for two more days! In their hour of need – when they thought they needed him most – their beloved friend was no where to be seen.

From where they stood, they must have felt so let down and felt a bit resentful hence we hear both of them exclaiming: "Lord if you were here, my brother would not have died". Lord if you were here, my brother would not have died!

Such statement raises questions such as: In difficult circumstances of our own life, what are we to think, when God does not act as quickly as we would want him to? I think whatever thoughts might cross our minds; God will always respond in God's time. Take for instance, our present situation: The world over – from medical teams, scientists, world leaders, leaders of all faith backgrounds, communities and individuals; our prayer is – KUMBAYA OUR LORD KUMBAYA – Lord, come by here – NOW – because we are desperate for divine intervention – But God respond in God's time, ours is to trust him.

When we are in the thick of trials, it is normal to feel abandoned, isolated, dejected and helpless. But we are never alone. Though it may seem as if all hope is gone, it is important that we trust God's word. From our bible reading today; when the messenger brought the news of Lazarus' illness, (at the beginning of this story v3) -the message given to take back to Martha and Mary was: "This illness does not lead to death but rather, it is for God's Glory" A statement which seem to contradict what really happened; but in actual fact it meant something extraordinary; beyond human comprehension.

Martha couldn't comprehend her brother raising from the dead, "there is stench, she protested." Martha's response demonstrates how difficult it is to believe in something so inconceivable? It was inconceivable not only because nature had taken its course on Lazarus's body that had been buried for 4 days but also **There was a tradition that one's soul hovered near the body for three days. After that time, there was no hope of resurrection. So, for them, Lazarus was surely gone.**

It is important to note here that, Jesus never reprimanded Martha for being so sceptical. Instead He seem to hope for Martha and us all, to be open to what God can do even in those moments when we feel we cannot quit get what it is we are grappling with — he seem to hope for us to be open to the possibility that our way of thinking can be wrong or that there could be better ways of understanding the same thing apart from that which our traditions dictate to us.

However, I would like to think that Jesus does know the legitimacy of how we approach situations. Jesus recognised the legitimacy of Martha's sentiments, and the same applies to us. He understand us and wishes to meet us where we are — within our traditions, our confusions, hopelessness and frustrations, he invites us to be open to His plans even though those plans might not make sense to us: "Take away the stone". He said to Martha, "Take away the stone". In faith, Martha obeyed — trusting in the word of him who know her best.

In the depth of our despair, our fears, worries and concerns. In the depth of grappling with the crisis caused by coronavirus, let us keep trusting God, that something good, great and wonderful will come out

of this corona season. I don't know about you, for me, I think people are looking out for each other more; people are spending more time with their families and making lasting memories; families are also looking out for their loved ones more; people seem be more conscious about their hygiene now; I think the world is cleaner as each company scrub their area top to bottom; there is less noise pollution — air pollution, water pollution; the world is quieter than it has ever been — surely that must be great for us and our environment.

As coronavirus keeps us contained in our countries and our homes—at least for the coming month— it is already reshaping our society in ways that will last. Even as a church, we are also being challenged to find pragmatic alternatives of worship; of pastoral care; of communion and holding other related meetings and gatherings.

Surely, what is bound to come out of this dark stench pit of our time is for the Glory of God to be see. Just as Lazarus was walked out of that dark cave, we shall also be set free and see the light once more.

As we look to the week ahead us, let us be encouraged by the words of Paul to the Galatians: "Let's not get tired of doing what is good. At just the right time we will reap a harvest of blessing if we don't give up" (Galatians 6:9 NLT). Remain in faith, and continue to love and serve the Lord in all the ways we can. **DON'T GIVE UP HOPE.**

As Julian Norwich prayed, let us also pray together:

All shall be well. All shall be well. Every manner of thing shall be well. Amen. (Julian Norwich)
